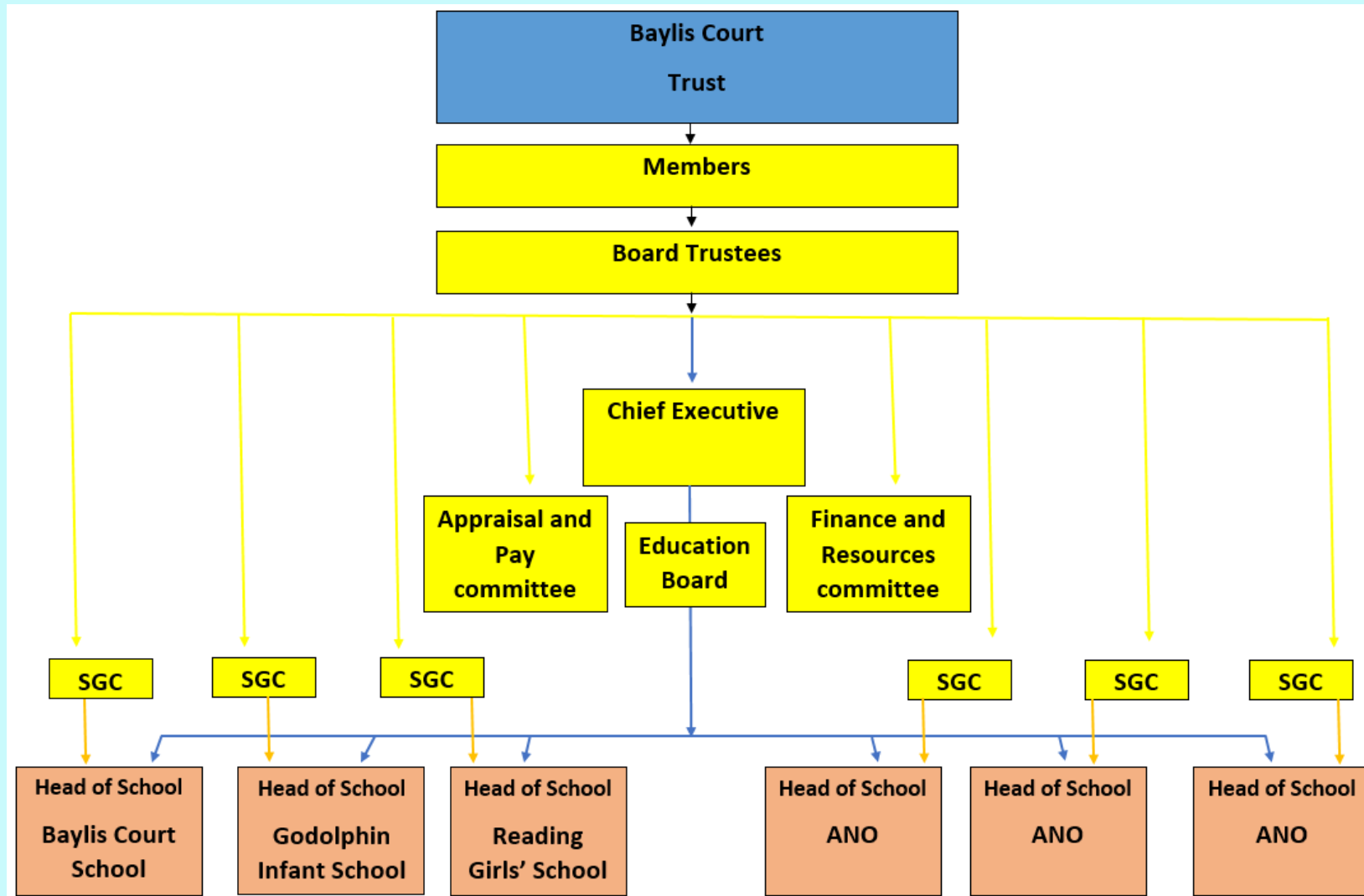
Who are we?

Why the Transfer will take place



The School has been required to become a sponsored academy school.

Under section 4 of the Academies Act 2010, the Secretary of State for Education **must** make an academy order in respect of a maintained school if it has been judged to be 'Inadequate' by Ofsted i.e. it is a school requiring significant improvement or special measures.

The Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) will take the lead in identifying the most suitable sponsor and brokering the new relationship between that sponsor and the school.

In multi academy trusts, each academy school will usually have its own School Governance Committee(SGC). These have a similar status to committees of a maintained governing body and the only powers they have are those that are delegated to them by the board. This is normally formalised into a scheme of delegation.

Whilst individuals serving on an LGB may also be trustees of the academy trust, retaining some distinction between the layers is important to ensure effective oversight and challenge. It is common for individuals serving on an SGC to be referred to a 'governors', although technically the governors of an academy trust are the trustees.
