On Tuesday 20 March 2012 storyteller Red Phoenix visited RGS. She had been invited to tell stories to nine classes, throughout the day in the school library. Her energy and enthusiasm shone through the strong women stories she told. Around 150 students from years 7, 8 and 9 came to listen.

Listening to stories improves students' listening skills and provides a variety of frameworks which they can use in their writing. Staff and students enjoyed the sessions and there were discussions during lunch on follow-up work that could be done in lessons. One student wrote, "I thought that the storytelling time with Red Phoenix was really interesting. I was really lucky to be there for two lessons. I loved all her stories and liked the part where she was making the noises and voices of the characters, like the growling troll, which made the story more realistic. Reading Girls' designs on

On Tuesday 28 February, Verizon, a global communications company, hosted a graduation ceremony for 30 pupils from Reading Girls' School.

Verizon bosses presented certificates to the girls who completed a 10-week website design course with staff from the company's European HQ in Reading.

The year 8 students learned web design and construction skills with the focus on a 2012 Olympics theme. Mrs Angus, said: "The Verizon project reinforces our own specialist learning areas of business and enterprise, providing a way to learn about technology within a stimulating real-life environment.

"It is also an excellent opportunity for the girls to develop their enterprise and work -related skills such as teamwork, planning, communication and creativity."

The certificates were awarded by Arnold Coleman, IT community outreach coordinator at Verizon. He said: "It is important that young people are introduced to IT skills at an early age, building their abilities, confidence and awareness. Verizon's IT community outreach programme aims to bridge the gap between business and education, and also provides our own employees with the opportunity to develop additional skills outside of their daily iohs."

The science department works closely with the Physics Department at Royal Holloway, University of London. Recent activities were lead by Dr Simon Reynolds their Science Outreach Officer in charge of Physics outreach, Science ambassadors and RGS science staff. Working in teams, the students enjoyed all the activities they participated.

Operation Golden Eagle

Students in Year 9 became secret agents for the day in a race to recover stolen gold. The students had to work in teams to over-



come a series of scientific challenges in order to recover gold stolen by a group of evil thieves.



Roller Coaster Physics

During the activity, students built their own roller coasters out of K'Nex and used them to explore the mechanics of roller coasters by performing experiments and calculations. Topics explored included forces, acceleration, energy transfers and collisions. The activity encouraged students to work as a team and gave them an opportunity to investigate mechanics in a practical way.



Talk Science

Year 10 Students worked in a selection of experiments and they had to prepare a short talk to explain their particular experiment in small groups. They then presented it to their peers. The talks were judged and the group with the best talk receives a small prize.

A group of enthusiastic students has recently been working toward the Eco-Schools award with volunteers from PriceWaterhouseCoopers. They have been looking at energy saving in school and are also investigating recycling of waste produced by the school.



As part of this project, the Science Ambassadors visited Grundon's Material

Recovery Facility at Beenham to find out what happens to the school's rubbish and how materials are recycled. They heard about how the waste is sorted and turned into reusable products by the 'Grundon Wizards'. They also saw the sorting facility and the myriad of conveyor belts carrying different varieties of waste around the site.

RHS Wisley

On Tuesday 18 March, eight students from Year 8 attended a Science Enterprise day at RHS Wisley. The girls looked at the theory behind how plants disperse their seeds, before taking part in a number of challenges to test these theories. These included launching a rocket, as well as making parachutes and boats. They competed very well against tough opposition, with one team coming

fourth and the other coming first and winning a crystal making kit for the group.



Team Maths Challenge

The Team Maths Challenge is a competition organised by the UK Mathematics Trust who have been dedicated to advancing the education of young people in Mathematics since they were established in 1996. The organisation runs a number of team and

individual events across the country, and for the first time, Reading Girls' School sent a team of four mathematicians from years 8 and 9 to the Regional Finals in Newbury where they competed in four rounds against 21 teams from different schools across the region. The rounds varied from team problem solving to a mathematical relay race. Here is what the girls had to say about the event:

"The Team Maths Challenge was a great experience. We were able to apply many Business and Enterprise skills such as teamwork and problem solving to the tasks, as well as our maths knowledge, and our running skills even came into play in the relay event! All of the teams at the event were really enthusiastic towards all of the challenges and everyone tried their best. Even though our team didn't win we had a really enjoyable day and would like to thank Mrs Wells and Miss Stoffels, as well as all of those involved with creating the Team Maths Challenge, for organising the event."
