
clothing, bags, belts, shoes and soft toys donated in 63 bags. Thank you to all those who supported this fund raising initiative.

## Year 7 Author Event

On Friday 11 November, all of our Year 7 students were lucky enough to experience part of Reading's **Crime Fiction** Festival. They



had the opportunity to listen to a talk by Andrew Lane, author of the Young Sherlock Holmes series, at Reading Town Hall. After telling the audience some interesting facts about his work on the set of Wallace and Gromit, the James Bond movies and the BBC Doctor Who series, Lane gave a detailed presentation about the character of Sherlock Holmes and the history of this mysterious detective since his first appearance. The author then explained how he tried to craft stories about Sherlock's teenage years where a 14 year old Sherlock is

already encountering murder, kidnap, corruption and more. At the Thursday 3 November end of the session, students had the chance to ask Andrew Lane questions about Sherlock Holmes and how he writes his novels.

## 'The Stanislavski Experience'

GCSE Drama students took part in practical workshops with 'The Stanislavski Experience' company. In their first workshop held on Friday 21 October professional actor and director Nick O'Brien walked the students through method acting techniques including relaxation exercises and emotional memory exercises. In the second workshop held on Friday 11 November, performer and physical theatre expert Annie Sutton came to train the girls in physical performance and epic theatre strategies.
